

Know the issues and candidates on a ballot before casting your vote.

Research candidates and policies so that you can make informed voting decisions.

Tip: Most states do not allow phones in the voting booth. Consider writing down your choices on paper so you can remember who and what you want to vote for.





If you plan to vote in-person on election day,

Locate your polling station and know the hours so you don't miss your chance to vote. Consider going early to avoid potential long wait times.
